WHAT TO SEE

THE CROWN JEWELS

The Tower of London has been home to the world famous British Crown Jewels since the beginning of the 14th century. Still used by the Queen and her family today, the Crown Jewels are an essential

part of your visit. • (See also The Wall Walk - the related Crowns and Diamonds exhibition.)

THE MEDIEVAL PALACE

The Tower of London was a residence for the kings and queens of England as well as being a fortress. These rooms are shown as they may have appeared in the reign of Edward I (1272-1307).



The Tower of London is surrounded by a series of massive defensive walls. A walk around this eastern section provides an opportunity to see how the wall towers have been

used since the 13th century.



This tower houses an exhibition, 'Crowns and Diamonds: the making of the Crown Jewels' (in collaboration with De Beers).

The Tower of London has many important buildings to explore and special events to take part in.



THE WHITE TOWER

Begun in the reign of William the Conqueror (1066-1087), the White Tower marks the start of the Tower of London's history.

TOWER GREEN



Some of the Tower's most famous prisoners were held around Tower Green including Sir Walter Ralegh, kept in the Bloody Tower for 13 years. At the scaffold site two of Henry VIII's wives, Anne Boleyn

and Catherine Howard, were beheaded. The Chapel Royal of St Peter ad Vincula is open for public worship on Sunday mornings (except in August). Otherwise the Chapel is open to the public only as part of the main Yeoman Warder guided tour, or from approximately one hour before Tower closing time.



As you enter through the West Gate you can get an impression of how the Tower was protected against attack. In Water Lane you can also see Traitor's Gate where

many famous prisoners entered the Tower of London for the last time.





The Army has been involved with the Tower of London since its creation and today, the Royal Regiment of Fusiliers open their museum to the public (as this is an independent museum there is a

small entrance charge).

Yeoman Warders (often called Beefeaters) have been at the Tower of London since the 14th century. Today they combine their traditional ceremonial role with that of tourist guide. The main tour (60 minutes) brings to life the Tower's history including imprisonment, torture and intrigue.

The Ravens are one of the most famous sights at the Tower of London. Legend has it that Charles II was warned that should the Ravens leave the Tower, the monarchy would fall, and he therefore ordered that henceforth a small population should always remain.

The Ceremony of the Keys takes place every night at the Tower. You can request free admission to the ceremony by writing well in advance to: The Ceremony of the Keys, Waterloo Block, HM Tower of London, EC3N 4AB, enclosing a stamped addressed envelope or 2 couponréponse international.

INFORMATION DURING YOUR VISIT

The Yeoman Warders and Jewel House and White Tower Wardens will be happy to answer any questions. Please ask them.

The Official Guidebooks provide more information on the Crown Jewels and the Tower of London and are available in the Tower's shops.

Elderly or Disabled Visitors: The Tower of London is an historic building with difficult stairs and passageways. If you need help during your visit please ask a Yeoman Warder, or ask for our free Access Guide. A limited number of wheelchairs are available for free hire from the Group Ticket Office and the Welcome Centre.

A sound guide, 'Prisoners of the Tower', is available in English, French, German, Russian, Japanese, Italian and Spanish from Water Lane. There is a small charge.

SHOPPING

White Tower Shop located within the White Tower, has ranges inspired by the history of the Tower, particularly relating to the Royal Armouries exhibition.

Tower Shop opposite the main entrance offers souvenirs of your visit to the Tower of London.





Medieval Palace Shop near the Ravens' lodgings has ranges based on the history of the Tower, including the Yeoman Warders and the Medieval Palace.



REFRESHMENTS P

New Armouries Café The New Armouries was originally built as a storehouse in 1663. As the new Tower restaurant it has a varied selection of foods in 'store' for Tower visitors. The menu includes hot and cold dishes, sandwiches, cakes, children's meals and hot and cold beverages.

Tower Café and Kiosk Friendly staff with a relaxed cafe atmosphere, offering panini's grilled to order, tea and coffee, home made cakes and desserts and ice cream. Seating available inside or outside, right next to the River Thames.

Currency Exchange \$\\$ (near West Gate Shop) is open from 10am to 6pm in the summer and until 5pm in the winter.




